

A MESSAGE FROM OUR LOCAL POLICE COMMUNITY TEAM

Hope you are all enjoying the lovely spring weather!

We would like to take this opportunity to advise all residents to stay vigilant and ensure that you secure your property by ensuring that when you are out your windows and doors are shut and secured, thus taking away any opportunity for you to fall victim of a burglary. Make sure that when you are at home and in the garden enjoying the warm weather the doors and windows are secured.

Operation Joshua is still one of our local policing priorities and involves reassurance visits to victims of burglary's. We offer support and advice, as well as making the local residents aware a burglary being committed in the area.

We are committed to tackling anti-social use of motor vehicles and those who persistently use mopeds, scrambler bikes and mini motos in a way that causes nuisance in a positive way. We now have the power to issue section 59 notices which can potentially mean the vehicle that the perpetrator is using can be seized. We have had some excellent results so far and encourage anyone who witnesses this type of behaviour to call it in and if you can get the registration numbers it aids us a great deal.

SPENDING TIME WITH GOD... FINDING THE WAY AHEAD...

On a day to day basis how much time do we put aside to be with God? This was a question posed at the beginning of a retreat day I attended in March – we didn't have to volunteer our answers! The day themed "Which Direction?" was run by a small team called "Travelling Light", people trained in listening and pastoral skills, some of whom are members of the Northumbria community. During the day we were reminded of Biblical passages where God had spoken with individuals as they were in prayer. We were also reminded that as in the example of Paul's conversion, God can also intervene in other ways.

With these thoughts in mind we were invited to spend time in prayer, with helpful texts and objects to concentrate our prayers, or to enjoy creating a painting or drawing or an origami object— or to take a walk in the nearby countryside. Lunch and tea provided an opportunity to meet those who had gathered for the day, coming from Herefordshire, Gloucestershire, Worcestershire and from over the Welsh border.

Why did I go? I know I tend to crowd my diary with too much activity. I had been looking to take time "off the treadmill" and to spend time with God. This proved to be ideal, quite close to home and inexpensive. The suggested donation for the day was £10 but there was no fixed charge. Those who led the day aimed to help those who came to receive from God in whatever way suited them best. Well organised and open to all, I would recommend it wholeheartedly. Their programme this year includes:

Sat 26th September "Be still" from 1030 – 1630; Sat 21st November "The Heart of God"; and reflective days on Wed 3rd June and Wed 14th October from 1000 – 1530.

- promote the common good of everyone, not treating us just as self-interested consumers
- demonstrate that the weak and the vulnerable are of equal value to everyone else
- respect the natural environment
- offer us a grown-up debate on Britain's place in the world order.

MORE FROM THE BIRD SANCTUARY

This will be my last bulletin of bird notes for a bit, because with the arrival of milder weather, the beaky brigade is much less in evidence. I'm writing these notes just before Easter, looking back over the last month.

I ended my last lot of notes by saying that we hadn't seen any goldfinches, so needless to say three arrived a day or so later. A "charm" of goldfinches is the collective noun, by the way. Whether three goldfinches quite constitutes a charm I'm not sure, but they were a welcome sight. They took no notice of the niger seeds specially provided, or of the teasel heads which we planted last year. But just yesterday, I was sitting at the computer upstairs and saw another goldfinch, peering briefly at me from a nearby tree branch.

In early March, a male blackcap was a regular visitor to the suet roll dispenser, but watching him through the binoculars, I noticed some undesirable tendencies. He had a way of turning his head sharply towards the perfectly amiable long tailed tit that was also feeding, and making pecking gestures at him. The blackcap is a member of the warbler family, and should in my view stick to warbling, not intimidating other small birds. I fixed up a small notice which said, quite reasonably, I think: "These facilities are provided for the benefit of ALL birds. Aggressive and antisocial behaviour will not be tolerated." I haven't seen the blackcap lately, so perhaps he has taken the hint, but other birds still need to modify their behaviour.

A pair of blackbirds amused us on the suet block for several consecutive days. They were trying to learn the gymnastic skills needed to cling on and peck at the same time, and at first their wings were fluttering ferociously. After a few days you'd think they had taken lessons from the blue tit, and were pecking away with excellent control, given their size.

Several pheasants have been coming in from the field next door and they make short work of the seed on the ground. I thought I would step out and cause them to do a rocketing demonstration. No chance: they just waddled off amiably through a hole in the hedge. Curiously, magpies are far more timid. They, too, like to scoop up the seed that I throw around in the front garden every morning, but if I see them, I have only to make the slightest movement inside the house, and off they go.

Our friends the hedge sparrows are still around in good numbers. Chaffinches have not been in evidence. Most of the other birds seem to be finding their food elsewhere, so the blue tits and great tits have little competition now. So all in all, I think the fun is over for the winter.

TANZANIA - ANOTHER WORLD

What an interesting evening we had at St Margaret's on February 15th, with Helen and Alistair Sammon, who spent a year or so working in Kasulu in Western Tanzania. You will recall from earlier announcements in Crossroads and Signpost that the aim of the evening was to get a fresh perspective on the life of the Church in Tanzania. We have had a long-standing link at St Margaret's, and hoped to revive and strengthen our interest. We were not disappointed.

I'm not going to attempt a summary of what they said. We hope very much that they will come again before too long. I assure you that this is an experience not to be missed. The slides they showed said it all. Here is a country and a Church where (in no particular order):

- the Christian faith only arrived about 100 years ago, but is still growing fast.
- people make their own bricks, and corrugated iron for a roof is a luxury
- the roads are mostly dirt tracks: a quagmire in wet seasons and a dustbowl in the dry. An evangelist is lucky if he has a bicycle, let alone a car.
- in the hospital where Alistair was working, the surgical equipment comes mostly from the local ironmonger. If a broken bone needs pinning, almost anything will do, but it is not likely to be clinical quality titanium. (Being squeamish, I will say no more).
- the hospital operating theatres may have lights or air conditioning but it is unusual and lucky if both are working
- there are no women priests though Helen was warmly welcomed.
- at a baptism, a washing-up bowl or even a saucepan may serve as a font. There may be dozens of candidates, some of whom might be Muslim converts.

 the collection in church may comprise fruit and vegetables: sugar cane, bananas and so on. These are the gifts of people who have no money and who live by the work of their own hands.

In questions, we wanted to know how we could help. There are various ways, of which more in a moment, but Bruce gently reminded us that we in England also have much to learn and to receive from a church where such great commitment is required, and is clearly not lacking.

We were able to give Helen a cheque for her to use as she thought best. I was delighted to learn within a few days that the money was on its way to the Diocese of Western Tanganyika and that an e-mail had gone ahead of it to Eden church (pronounced Edden by the way) which will receive the money.

Our hope is that we can form a regular link with Eden church, which we can support by prayer as well as giving, and who knows, perhaps we can welcome some folk from Tanzania sometime in the future. Thank you, Helen and Alistair, for your fascinating insights.
